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Parental/Guardian Permission Form for Department Pool Participants Earning Credit

Your child, _____, is invited to take part in a study named "Identification of Scenes When Viewed in Sequences" The study is designed to learn more about how we identify sets of images of natural scenes when they are displayed in a series. It is being conducted by Aaron Bornstein, who is the principal investigator, as part of his post-graduate research. The faculty sponsor of this work is Nathaniel Daw, in the Department of Psychology.

If you give permission for your child to be in this study, he/she will be asked to view a sequence of repeated presentations of simple scenes of natural landscapes selected from a small set. During the presentation, he or she will be required to identify which scene of the set is currently being presented by selecting the relevant number on a standard computer keyboard. Your child's participation will take about one hour, and he or she will receive 1 credit for laboratory participation towards the course research requirement. When your child completes the study, a thorough verbal and written explanation of it will be given to him/her.

There are no known risks associated with your child's participation in this research beyond those of everyday life. Although your child will receive no direct benefits for participation in this study, it may make him or her more aware of how knowledge is discovered in psychology and help the investigator better understand the cognitive processes underlying decision-making.

Taking part in this study is voluntary. Not taking part or withdrawing after the study has begun will not affect your child's grade or academic standing in any way. If your child withdraws at any time, he or she will still receive the 1 credit offered for taking part. Your child has the right to skip or not answer any questions he or she prefers not to answer.

Confidentiality of your child's research records will be strictly maintained by not linking them to any identifying information. The data from the study will be archived securely and separately from any identifying materials until at least 5 years after publication, as recommended by the American Psychological Association.
