Your child, \_\_\_\_\_, is invited to take part in a study named Intergroup Decision-Making II (EEG). The study is designed to learn more about the neural mechanisms of how people process and implement decisions within groups. It is being conducted by Prof. David Amodio, who is the principal investigator, and members of his research team.

If you give permission for your child to be in this study, he/she will be asked to: complete a series of decision-making tasks over the computer while wearing a stretchy cap with EEG sensors embedded in it to record brain activity. Gel from the sensors may get in your child's hair, but it is harmless and can be washed out easily. He/she will also fill out some short questionnaires. Your child's participation will take about 2 hours, and he or she will receive 2.0 credits for laboratory participation towards the course research requirement. When your child completes the study, a thorough verbal and written explanation of it will be given to him/her.

There are no known risks associated with your child's participation in this research beyond those of everyday life. Although your child will receive no direct benefits for participation in this study, it may make him or her more aware of how knowledge is discovered in psychology and help the investigator better understand how different types of information are processed in the mind and how they may affect the way people make decisions within groups.

Taking part in this study is voluntary. Not taking part or withdrawing after the study has begun will not affect your child's grade or academic standing in any way. If your child withdraws at any time, no credit but also no penalty will be given. Your child has the right to skip or not answer any questions he/she prefers not to answer.

Confidentiality of your child's research records will be strictly maintained by using only random codes. The data from the study will be kept at least until 5 years after publication, as recommended by the American Psychological Association. When it is destroyed, this will be done by shredding paper and deleting electronic media.
